

What trees and woods do for you

Wildlife: Woodland is one of our richest habitats. Planting more woods and trees, particularly next to existing ancient woodland, will help create more spaces for wildlife and support their conservation as the climate changes.

Wood fuel and energy: Well-stocked mixed-broadleaved coppice woodland should produce about 3 tonnes of air-dried wood per hectare per year, while shelter around buildings can reduce heating costs by as much as 40 per cent.

Hard-to-work areas: Keep quality land in production and integrate trees by planting in field corners, or areas that are difficult to access or graze.

Windbreaks: Windbreaks on farms offer protection for crops and help reduce water loss from soils and plants, particularly in dry years. They also help maintain populations of pollinating insects, particularly when the windbreak is incorporated into existing hedgerows.

Shelter and shade: Trees planted for livestock increase productivity by reducing heat stress in summer and chill factor in winter, helping maintain animal welfare conditions through season and climate change.

Flood Management and river shading: Trees can assist in controlling flood peaks down stream and may help in cooling streams and rivers through shade, improving habitats for fish and other wildlife.

Food: Avoid the air-miles by growing your own tasty fruits and nuts.

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

How does the scheme work?


MOREwoods is available to landowners in England who have a minimum of one hectare (2.5 acres) of land to plant. This includes shelterbelts and can comprise a number of smaller sites.

We offer expert advice and guidance on creating new native woodland to all applicants. We can only contribute funding when applicants are willing to make a contribution to the costs. This can be through planting the trees yourself, making a financial contribution or by working with us to access Forestry Commission grants.

All approved applicants will be visited by one of our expert advisers, who will check your land is suitable for planting and advise on species selection, protection and design. We take great care to avoid planting on sites which have existing conservation value as open sites. Aftercare support will help ensure your new trees flourish and remain healthy.
